

Featured Speakers



Dr. Alan Ashworth is the director of the UCSF Helen Diller Family Comprehensive Cancer Center, a multidisciplinary research and clinical care organization that is one of the largest cancer centers in the Western United States. Dr. Ashworth's current research focuses on personalized cancer medicine by exploiting genetic weaknesses in cancer cells. Through the development of clinical trials, Dr. Ashworth is dedicated to improving patient care.

Amie Blanco, MS, CGC

Amie Blanco is a genetic counselor and the acting director of the UCSF Cancer Genetics and Prevention Program. She completed her genetic counseling training at UT-Health and MD Anderson Cancer Center, where she held a position as a cancer prevention education fellow. Currently, Ms. Blanco is a lecturer in the medical school and mentors genetic counseling students from two bay area genetic counseling training programs. She has published numerous articles about hereditary cancer syndromes, including a chapter in the popular book *Everyone's Guide to Cancer Therapy, 5th Addition.* Amie helped to develop the clinical consent for UCSF's genomic tumor profiling test known as "UCSF500".

Sarah Adkins, MD

Dr. Sarah Adkins is an attending physician for the Symptom Management Services team and is passionate about palliative medicine. As a relatively new member to the UCSF family, Dr. Adkins comes to us from New York where she attended medical school at Columbia University. After completing her residency in Internal Medicine at Weill-Cornell Medical Center, Dr. Adkins came to UCSF to work on her Fellowship with Palliative Medicine. Sarah is a truly exceptional clinician and combines her work in the outpatient clinic as well as consultation at the Mission Bay hospital.

Lawrence Fong, MD

Dr. Fong is the Co-Leader of the Cancer Immunotherapy Program (CIP) at UCSF Helen Diller Family Comprehensive Cancer Center and Efim Guzik Distinguished Professor in Cancer Biology. His research focuses on how the immune system interacts with cancer, investigating how immunotherapies such as immune checkpoint inhibitors and cancer vaccines can enhance anti-tumor immunity in patients. The Cancer Immunotherapy Program serves to provide to patients and their families with streamlined access to cancer immunotherapies trials and to bring together expert UCSF physicians and scientists from all cancer sub-specialists to foster and develop cancer treatments of the future.

Stefanie Ueda, MD

Dr. Stefanie Ueda specializes in gynecologic cancers, with a particular interest in ovarian cancer and robotic surgery. Her research has addressed conditions and treatments including low grade serous and clear cell ovarian cancer, uterine serous cancer, biologically targeted therapies and clinical treatment outcomes. Dr. Ueda has primarily been focusing on expanding the presence of UCSF's Division of Gynecologic Oncology in Global Health. She has been collaborating with Dr. Meg Autry and Dr. Felicia Lester to develop a clinical education and surgical training program at Mulago Hospital and Makarere University, the largest public hospital and medical school in Uganda.

Pauline Beggs, RN

Pauline Beggs is a registered nurse in gynecologic oncology for over 30 years. Pauline received her nursing education in the United Kingdom and went on to complete postgraduate training in stress management. She is the recipient of the prestigious 2011 Ernest H. Rosenbaum, MD Symptom Management Service Commitment to Patient Care Award for her passionate devotion to providing exceptionally high-quality patient care. Pauline is one of the honorees of the prestigious DAISY Award for Extraordinary Nurses in 2016.
