Education Pearls: Gender Inclusive History Taking

We are committed to gender inclusive teaching at UCSF, acknowledging that the transgender men and non-binary persons among our OB/GYN patients are deserving of respectful care reflecting the dignity of their personhood. If you have any questions or concerns about inclusivity in your teaching of students, incorporation in your practice or training your staff, please let us know and we can put you in touch with subject-matter experts. Courtesy of Dr. Gaetan Pettigrew, here are some tips for gender inclusive history taking:

- 1. **Gender and sexuality are two very different things** (seems intuitive but many people don't understand this idea, likely our students will but I always like to remind myself of this even now
- 2. **Always elicit preferred pronouns** i.e. when I introduce myself I provide my preferred pronouns to the patient and then I ask them how they would like me to address them and what their preferred pronouns are
- 3. I always preface my interview by saying something along the lines of 'during our conversation today **I will use anotomic terms for the structures we will discuss such as uterus or cervix**, if this doesn't work for you are the terms that you use to describe these parts about yourself...'
- 4. When it comes to sexual history, I try to frame the questions more around sexual practices; I ask initially how they patient would categorize their sexuality i.e., straight, gay, bi, pansexual etc. I then elicit gender identity of sexual partners, and whether there is insertive intercourse either vaginal or anal. I usually try to also start this line of questioning with something like, 'the next few questions will be about your sexual history and sexual practices so that I can best access your risks and council you appropriately i.e STI screening and contraceptive counseling.
- 5. Lastly, I always try to end with asking for feedback and if there is anything that made the patient feel uncomfortable i.e language used or terminology to make their experience better.
